

ARTIST'S PROFILE

When mixed-media artist Claudine Hellmuth recalls her childhood, some of her fondest memories are of summers spent in England at her grandmother's cottage.

"She passed away about two years ago, but I'll never forget the time I spent with her." Claudine says. "I wanted to pay tribute to her and to all the everyday activities that helped define my childhood."

With a degree in fine art from the Corcoran College of Art, Claudine approaches collage the old-fashloned way, enjoying the challenge of working with a variety of materials and cut-

ting, gluing, and painting her artwork by hand. Though she usually works on canvas, she needed the roominess of a blank journal for this project.

Orlando, Florida-based Claudine has spent the last few years perfecting

her unique blend of photos and line drawings she calls "poppets," a British endearment her, grandma often used. See more of Claudine's work in her new book, Collage Discovery Workshop: Beyond the Unexpected, due in stores this fall. Or go

She painted the scene from memory, with chairs and a table that always seemed a bit too tall for her.
